2 DAY FILM-THEATRE ARMOURER



Introduction

The use of blank-firing firearms on stage or set involves stripping away layers of accepted firearms protocols. It requires a lot less rigid dogma and a lot more in the way of flexibility, research, thought and understanding of the issues involved. It is not a standardised process and so there can be no laid down rules upon which to fall back. In addition to the above, considerable pressure can be felt by those supervising firearms on set to cut corners in the interests of speed, convenience or camera angles.

This course aims to give students the information and understanding required to operate firearms, in the entertainment industry environment, safely and within the law. To enable students to appreciate the judgements and decisions that need to be made, with regard to the following subjects (see 'Scope'), and to be able to recognise their limitations and seek specialist advice as required.

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The standby Armourer must be confident, as well as competent, enough to ensure that firearms handling on set is both safe and period correct



Muzzle blast. The dangers from particles of propellant, wads, restrictors, etc. leaving the muzzle at high speeds are very real. Safe distances must be established and enforced



The flash from the breech can be as much of a hazard to the firer as the flash from the muzzle is to the rest of the cast/crew. Proper instruction in the use of muzzle loaders is essential



With live performances and filming in public spaces, safety measures are complex – and not just for the cast & crew. Noise can be a big consideration for the audience and/or public too!

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Productions can be enhanced considerably where the flash and bang of a muzzle loading pistol is used, the armourer and cast must work as a team to ensure all runs smoothly



Blank ammunition comes in all shapes and sizes, understanding the differences and how they function within a firearm is a complex subject



Blank firing firearms behave differently to live firing ones. Artists need to be taught to, for example, simulate recoil



It goes without saying that the vast majority of ammunition used on set is blank! However, there may be occasions when a projectile of sorts is required to be fired. Special, very special, measures need to be in place for those occasions...

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
